JAIPUR: Three Indian horse riders will participate in a traditional sports festival to be held at Denzili in Turkey from October 10 to 14. Organisers had invited Indigenous Horse Society of India (IHSI) to participate in tent pegging.

Traditional sports such as archery on horseback, Buzkashi (it is played with a headless goat's carcass) and tent pegging

with lances and swords will also be held along with other Asian and Middle Eastern sports. "Colonel Sarpartap Singh (retd) and Sushil Kumar will accompany me on this occasion to demonstrate tent pegging with lances and swords," said Raghuvendra Singh Dundlod, secretary general, IHSI.

"It is a fine opportunity for Indian horse riders to show their skills at a global level. The festival will begin with javelin throw on horseback and will finish on October14 with strongman truck pull and sumo tournament," added Dundlod.

An exhibition and presentation about the indigenous breed of horses from India will also be organised at the festival.

"An exchange will also take place to understand Turkish horses and its history. We will also meet Turkish horse breeders, Government Equine Centre and veterirarians," said Col Singh, a veteran horse rider.

"It is a pity that we have once again lost an opportunity to showcase Marwari and Kathiawari horses at a global level due to the Union agriculture ministery's illogical export policy," said Raghuvendra Singh Dundlod.
